3 4 ENROLLED, An Act, 5 To establish the Alabama Industry Recognized and 6 Registered Apprenticeship Program Act; to establish the 7 Alabama Office of Apprenticeship to certify certain registered 8 and industry recognized apprenticeship programs; to develop 9 the Alabama Registered and Industry Recognized Apprenticeship 10 Program; to provide incentives to employers who hire 11 apprentices; to offer a nationally recognized state 12 apprenticeship credential; to amend Sections 40-18-422, 40-18-423, and 40-18-424 of the Code of Alabama 1975, relating 13 14 to the Apprenticeship Tax Credit Act of 2016; to increase the 15 per capita apprenticeship tax credit from \$1,000 to \$1,250, 16 increase the aggregate apprenticeship tax credit from 17 \$3,000,000 to \$7,500,000, provide a \$500 per capita incentive tax credit for hiring in school youth apprentices; to extend 18 19 the apprenticeship tax credit through 2025; and to clarify 20 that the State Department of Education shall continue to be 21 the eligible agency to receive and administer career and 22 technical education funding under the Perkins Act. 23 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

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Section 1. Sections 1 to 7, inclusive, shall be
 known and may be cited as the Alabama Industry Recognized and
 Registered Apprenticeship Program Act.

Section 2. For the purposes of Sections 1 to 7,
inclusive, the following terms shall have the following
meanings:

7 (1) APPRENTICE. A worker who is at least 16 years of
8 age, except where a higher minimum age standard is otherwise
9 fixed by law, who is employed to learn an apprenticeable
10 occupation as provided in 29 CFR 29.4.

(2) APPRENTICESHIP AGREEMENT. A written agreement between an apprentice and either the apprenticeship program sponsor, or an apprenticeship committee acting as agent for the apprenticeship program sponsor or sponsors, which contains the terms and conditions of the employment and training of the apprentice in conformance with 29 CFR 29 and Section 40-18-421, Code of Alabama 1975.

(3) APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM. A plan containing all
terms and conditions for the qualification, recruitment,
selection, employment, and training of apprentices, as
required under the federal guidelines in CFR Title 29,
Subtitle A, parts 29 and 30, U.S.C. §50, for apprenticeship
programs certified by the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship,
and the rules adopted by the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship,

including such matters as the requirement for a written
 apprenticeship agreement.

3 (4) CANCELLATION. The termination of the
4 registration or approval status of an apprenticeship program
5 at the request of the sponsor, or termination of an
6 apprenticeship agreement at the request of the apprentice.

(5) CERTIFICATION or CERTIFICATE. The written
approval by the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship of a set of
apprenticeship standards or of an individual for employment as
an apprentice or probationary apprentice in a registered
apprenticeship program or proof that an apprentice has
successfully met the requirements to receive an interim
credential.

14 (6) DEREGISTRATION. The termination of the
15 registration or approval status of an apprenticeship program
16 upon written request of the sponsor or upon cause by the
17 Alabama Office of Apprenticeship instituting formal
18 deregistration proceedings.

19 (7) ELIGIBLE EMPLOYER. The same meaning as provided
 20 in Section 40-18-421, Code of Alabama 1975.

(8) EMPLOYER. Any person or organization employing
 an apprentice, whether or not the person or organization is a
 party to an apprenticeship agreement with the apprentice.

(9) FEDERAL PURPOSES. Any action related to a
 federal contract, grant, agreement, or arrangement dealing

with an apprenticeship. The term includes any federal
 financial or other assistance, benefit, privilege,
 contribution, allowance, exemption, preference, or right
 pertaining to an apprenticeship.

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(11) INDUSTRY-RECOGNIZED APPRENTICESHIP. A high 6 7 quality apprenticeship program that includes a paid work 8 component and an educational or instructional component 9 wherein an individual obtains workplace relevant knowledge and 10 skills developed or delivered by third parties, including 11 trade and industry groups, companies, nonprofit organizations, 12 educational institutions, unions, and joint labor management 13 organizations.

14 (12) IN SCHOOL YOUTH. A youth described in Section
15 129(a)(1)(C) of the federal Workforce Innovation and
16 Opportunity Act.

17 (13) ON-THE-JOB TRAINING. Training by an employer 18 that is provided to a paid participant while engaged in 19 productive work in a job that provides knowledge or skills 20 essential to the full and adequate performance of the job; is 21 made available through a program that provides reimbursement 22 to the employer of up to 50 percent of the wage rate of the 23 participant, except as provided in Section 134(c)(3)(H) of the 24 federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, for the extraordinary costs of providing the training and additional 25

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(10) GOVERNOR. The chief executive of this state.

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1	supervision related to the training; and is limited in
2	duration as appropriate to the occupation for which the
3	participant is being trained, taking into account the content
4	of the training, the prior work experience of the participant,
5	and the service strategy of the participant, as appropriate.
6	(14) REGISTERED APPRENTICESHIP. A formal, on-the-job
7	training program registered by the Alabama Office of
8	Apprenticeship that includes all of the following:
9	a. Employer involvement.
10	b. On-the-job training.
11	c. Related technical instruction.
12	d. Paid work experience.
13	e. A portable, nationally recognized industry
14	credential.
15	(15) REGISTERED PREAPPRENTICESHIP. A program or set
16	of strategies, registered by the Alabama Office of
17	Apprenticeship, including basic skills training, academic
18	skills remediation, or introduction to the industry, designed
19	to prepare individuals for entry into an apprenticeship
20	program.
21	(16) REGISTERED YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP. A program that
22	is designed specifically for individuals aged 16 to 18,
23	inclusive, registered by the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship,
24	and is connected to an adult apprenticeship.

1 (17) REGISTRATION AGENCY. The agency that has 2 responsibility for registering apprenticeship programs and 3 apprentices, providing technical assistance, and conducting 4 review for compliance with existing state law and the state 5 plan for equal employment opportunities.

6 (18) REQUIRED TECHNICAL INSTRUCTION. An organized 7 and systematic form of instruction designed to provide the 8 apprentice with knowledge of the theoretical and technical 9 subjects related to the occupation of the apprentice. The 10 instruction may be given in a classroom, through occupational 11 or industrial courses, or by correspondence courses of 12 equivalent value, electronic media, or other forms of 13 self-study for registered and industry-recognized 14 apprenticeship programs certified by the Alabama Office of 15 Apprenticeship. The sponsor shall be responsible for the administration and supervision of related and supplemental 16 instruction for apprentices and coordination of the 17 18 instruction with job experience.

(19) SPONSOR. Any person, association, committee, or
 organization operating a preapprenticeship, youth registered
 apprenticeships, youth industry-recognized apprenticeship
 programs, registered apprenticeships, and industry-recognized
 apprenticeship programs.

24 (20) STATE APPRENTICESHIP AGENCY. The Alabama Office25 of Apprenticeship.

1 (21) STATE APPRENTICESHIP INTERMEDIARY. The Alabama 2 Community College System shall be the intermediary and shall 3 provide required technical instruction and technical 4 assistance for implementing on-the-job training for all 5 apprenticeable programs certified by the Alabama Office of 6 Apprenticeship with the consent of the sponsor.

7 (22) VETERAN. The meaning given the term in Section
8 101 of Title 38, United States Code.

9 (23) WORK BASED LEARNING. Sustained interactions 10 with industry or community professionals in real workplace 11 settings, to the extent practicable, or simulated environments 12 at an educational institution that foster in-depth, first-hand 13 engagement with the tasks required of a given career field, 14 that are aligned to curriculum and instruction.

15 Section 3. (a) There is established the Alabama 16 Office of Apprenticeship as a part of the Workforce 17 Development Division of the Department of Commerce, in 18 accordance with 29 U.S.C. 50, 29 CFR 29 and 30, and Article 19 20, commencing with Section 40-18-420, of Chapter 18, Title 20 40, Code of Alabama 1975, the Apprenticeship Tax Credit Act of 21 2016. The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship is established for 22 all of the following purposes:

(1) To exercise nonexclusive authority to determine
 whether an apprenticeship program conforms to the regulations
 published in 29 CFR 29 and 30.

(2) To set forth labor standards necessary to
 safeguard the welfare of apprentices.

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3 (3) To establish policies and procedures for the
 4 registration and deregistration of preapprenticeships, youth
 5 registered apprenticeships, and registered apprenticeships.

6 (4) To serve as the registration agency for 7 preapprenticeships, youth registered apprenticeships, 8 registered apprenticeships, and industry-recognized 9 apprenticeships in the state when the sponsor of such programs 10 chooses to certify or register the programs with the Alabama 11 Office of Apprenticeship.

12 (5) To resolve disputes arising between the parties
 13 involved in an apprenticeship agreement registered by the
 14 Alabama Office of Apprenticeship.

15 (b) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship shall be maintained under the direction of the Deputy Secretary of the 16 17 Workforce Development Division of the Department of Commerce. 18 The deputy secretary, with the advice and consent of the 19 Alabama Apprenticeship Council created pursuant to Section 6, 20 may appoint a director for the Alabama Office of 21 Apprenticeship, who shall serve at the pleasure of the deputy 22 secretary, shall manage the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, 23 and shall perform such duties as necessary to effectuate the 24 intent of Sections 1 to 7, inclusive.

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1 (c) The deputy secretary, no later than June 30, 2 2019, with the advice and consent of the Alabama 3 Apprenticeship Council, shall submit to the United States 4 Secretary of Labor and the Administrator of the national 5 Office of Apprenticeship, in accordance with 29 CFR 29.13(a), 6 an application to recognize the Alabama Office of 7 Apprenticeship as a state apprenticeship agency that shall 8 comply with 29 CFR 29.13(a)-(c). The application for 9 recognition as a state apprentice agency, submitted by the 10 deputy secretary, shall include all of the following elements: 11 (1) A description of policies and operating 12 procedures that depart from, or impose requirements in 13 addition to, 29 CFR 29. 14 (2) A state plan for equal employment opportunity in 15 apprenticeship that conforms to the requirements published in 16 29 CER 30. 17 (3) A description of the basic standards, criteria,

requirements for program registration or approval, or both, and a demonstration of the linkages and coordination with the economic development and publicly funded workforce investment system of the state.

(4) A description of how the Alabama Office of
 Apprenticeship will utilize the Alabama Apprenticeship
 Council.

(5) A description of respective powers of the
 Alabama Office of Apprenticeship and the Alabama
 Apprenticeship Council.

4 (6) A description of the required contents of
5 apprenticeship agreements, in conformity with 29 CFR 29.7.

6 (7) A plan to ensure that the registration of 7 apprenticeship programs occurs only in apprenticeable 8 occupations, as provided in 29 CFR 29.4, including occupations 9 in high growth and high demand industries, including a 10 description of how the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship will 11 expand apprenticeship opportunities in apprenticeable 12 occupations listed on the regional and statewide list of 13 in-demand career pathways.

14 (8) A plan to accord reciprocal approval, for federal purposes, to apprentices, apprenticeship programs, and 15 16 standards that are registered in other states by the national 17 Office of Apprenticeship or a registration agency, if such 18 reciprocity is requested by the apprenticeship program 19 sponsor. Program sponsors seeking reciprocal approval shall 20 meet wage and hour provisions and apprentice ratio standards 21 of this state.

(9) A plan providing for the cancellation or
 deregulation, or both, of programs, for temporary suspension,
 cancellation, or deregistration, or any of these, of
 apprenticeship agreements.

Section 4. (a) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, with the advice and consent of the Alabama Apprenticeship Council, shall develop a nationally recognized state apprenticeship completion credential, as described in 29 CFR 29.5, for completing a registered or industry-recognized apprenticeship program registered with the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship.

8 (b) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship may certify 9 industry-recognized apprenticeships, registered with the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, as eligible training 10 11 providers for the purpose of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, P.L. 113-128, and may deliver services to 12 13 registered apprenticeship participants with qualifying 14 training accounts under Title I of the federal Workforce 15 Innovation and Opportunity Act, P.L. 113-128, through the 16 eligible training provider list of each regional workforce 17 development board.

(c) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, with the
advice and consent of the Alabama Apprenticeship Council and
pursuant to the Alabama Administrative Procedure Act, may
adopt rules as necessary to effectuate the intent of this act,
and those rules shall conform to the published apprenticeship
guidelines in 29 CFR 20 and 30.

24 (d) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, with the
 25 advice and consent of the Alabama Apprenticeship Council, may

1 approve apprenticeship programs that are mandated by state or 2 federal law as a result of the apprenticeship sponsor 3 receiving funds or resources from the state, or funds or 4 resources from the federal government, which require the 5 creation of an apprenticeship program in accordance with a 6 federal grant administered by the state, including contracts, 7 grants, loans, tax abatements or exemptions, land transfers, 8 land disposition and development agreements, tax increment 9 financing, or any combination thereof.

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10 (e) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship shall 11 establish competency based apprenticeship frameworks based on 12 the regional and statewide compendia of valuable credentials 13 created by the Alabama Workforce Council Committee on 14 Credentialing and Career Pathways. The Alabama Office of 15 Apprenticeship shall establish competency based apprenticeship 16 frameworks for each occupation listed on a regional and statewide list of in-demand career pathways. 17

(f) The Alabama Committee on Credentialing and Career Pathways shall be charged with analyzing primary and secondary labor market data and data from the Alabama Terminal on Linking and Analyzing Statistics on Career Pathways to determine, annually, among the 16 career clusters and 79 associated career pathways, which career pathways are indemand at the regional and state level.

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. 1	(g) The Alabama Committee on Credentialing and
2	Career Pathways by majority vote of a present quorum, shall
3	provide recommendations for appointment to the Governor, who
4	shall appoint a technical advisory committee for each of the
5	16 career and technical education career clusters.
6	(h) Each technical advisory committee shall conform
7	to all of the following parameters:
8	(1) Each shall be composed of seven members who
9	shall possess experience in education, workforce, or economic
10	development in the industry segment for which the technical
11	advisory committee is formed.
12	(2) Each shall maintain a majority of workforce and
13	economic development representatives.
14	(3) No later than June 30, 2020, each of the 16
15	technical advisory committees shall create an industry
16	competency model and competency-based career lattice for,
17	based on the United States Department of Labor's Career
18	Pathways Toolkit and Competency Model Clearinghouse, each
19	O*NET occupation code within that technical advisory
20	committee's career clusters and respective career pathways
21	with three or more stars on a regional or statewide in-demand
22	career pathways list. The Alabama Committee on Credentialing
23	and Career Pathways, annually, shall create statewide and
24	regional compendia of valuable credentials, derived from the
25	statewide and regional lists of in-demand career pathways.

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(i) The Alabama Workforce Council Committee on
Credentialing and Career Pathways shall be composed of all of
the following:
(1) The cochairs of the committee shall be the
Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System and the
State Superintendent of Education.
(2) The membership of the committee shall be
composed of all of the following ex officio members and
appointees, or their designees:
a. The Governor.
b. The Chair of the Alabama Workforce Council.
c. The Chair of the Alabama Workforce Development
Board.
d. The State Superintendent of Education.
e. The Chancellor of the Alabama Community College
System.
f. The Secretary of the Alabama Department of Labor.
g. The Secretary of the Alabama Department of
Commerce, Division of Workforce Development.
h. The Executive Director of the Alabama Commission
on Higher Education.
i. The President of the Alabama Council of College
and University Faculty Presidents.
j. Seven members appointed by the Governor, from
each of the seven workforce regions, each of whom shall be a

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member of a regional workforce council or a local workforce
 development board.

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3 Section 5. (a) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, 4 in consultation with the Governor's Office of Education and 5 Workforce Transformation, the P-20W Council, the Alabama Workforce Council Committee on Credentialing and Career 6 7 Pathways, the State Department of Education, the Alabama 8 Community College System, the Alabama Workforce Council, the 9 regional workforce councils, the State Workforce Development 10 Board, and the local workforce development boards, to the 11 maximum extent practicable and permissible under state and 12 federal law, shall align the required technical instruction 13 and on-the-job training required for the completion of 14registered and industry-recognized apprenticeship programs in the state offered to career and technical education 15 16 concentrators to the regional and statewide lists of in-demand career pathways credentials and to the two-prong career 17 18 pathways model created by the Alabama Workforce Council 19 Committee on Credentialing and Career Pathways.

(b) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, in
consultation with the Governor's Office of Education and
Workforce Transformation, the P-20W Council, the Alabama
Workforce Council Committee on Credentialing and Career
Pathways, the State Department of Education, the Alabama
Community College System, the Alabama Workforce Council, the

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1 regional workforce councils, the State Workforce Development 2 Board, and the local workforce development boards, shall 3 develop the Alabama Industry Recognized and Registered 4 Apprenticeship (AIRRAP) model that shall be aligned to the 5 regional and statewide lists of in-demand career pathways, to 6 the regional and statewide compendia of valuable credentials, 7 and to the two-pronged career pathways model created by the 8 Alabama Workforce Council Committee on Credentialing and 9 Career Pathways. The AIRRAP model shall conform to all of the 10 following parameters:

11 (1) Beginning in 9th grade, students may participate 12 in preapprenticeship programs aligned to career pathways and 13 credentials designated as valuable by the state compendium of 14 valuable credentials. During 10th, 11th, and 12th grade, 15 students may participate in youth registered apprenticeships 16 and industry-recognized apprenticeship programs. AIRRAP model 17 graduates may earn their high school diploma, associate 18 degree, industry-recognized credentials, and an apprenticeship 19 credential at the time of high school graduation. Students 20 participating in youth apprenticeships may also participate in 21 dual enrollment courses at a community college. The State 22 Department of Education and the Alabama Community College 23 System shall collaborate to streamline articulation agreements 24 among career pathways participating in the AIRRAP model to 25 ensure a seamless transition between high school and community

college. The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship shall promote
 dual enrollment and postsecondary graduation credit for
 work-based learning credits earned while participating in
 secondary in school youth AIRRAP model programs.

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5 (2) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship and the 6 Alabama Community College System shall promote apprenticeship 7 programs for individuals who are coenrolled in adult basic 8 education programs and postsecondary career and technical 9 education programs to ensure that individuals who are 10 disengaged from the workforce are able to gain access to 11 education and training programs, with multiple points of entry 12 and exit, with a focus on targeting the underemployed, 13 historically underrepresented subgroups, the formerly 14 incarcerated, out-of-school youth, recipients of temporary 15 assistance for needy families, supplemental security income, 16 or supplemental nutritional assistance programs, the long-term 17 unemployed, those recovering from substance abuse, veterans, 18 displaced homemakers, and other special populations and 19 subgroups. The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship shall promote 20 the use of the federal workforce opportunity tax credit to 21 hire eligible AIRRAP model participants. The Alabama Office of 22 Apprenticeship in cooperation with the Alabama Community 23 College System and the State Department of Education, may 24 establish an awards and recognition program for employers who 25 hire in school youth and adult AIRRAP model participants.

1 Section 6. (a) The Alabama Apprenticeship Council, 2 which shall be composed of public and private persons 3 representing employer and employee organizations that are 4 familiar with apprenticeable occupations, is established. All appointing authorities shall coordinate their appointments so 5 that diversity of gender, race, and geographical areas is 6 7 reflective of the makeup of this state. The membership of the council shall consist of all of the following: 8 9 (1) The Governor, who shall serve as ex officio 10 chair of the council. 11 (2) The Lieutenant Governor. 12 (3) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate. 13 (4) The Speaker of the House of Representatives. 14 (5) The Chancellor of the Alabama Community College 15 System. 16 (6) The State Superintendent of Education. 17 (7) The Chair of the Alabama Workforce Development 18 Board. 19 (8) The Chair of the Alabama Workforce Council. 20 (9) Nine members appointed by the Governor, and 21 confirmed by the Senate, for a renewable term of service. The 22 Governor shall assure that the membership of the council is 23 inclusive and reflects the racial, gender, geographic, urban, rural, and economic diversity of the state. The members of the 24

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1	council appointed pursuant to this subdivision shall satisfy
2	all of the following qualifications:
3	a. Three members shall be representatives of
4	employer organizations.
5	b. Three members shall be public representatives who
6	are members of employee or employer organizations.
7	c. Three members shall be representatives of
8	employee organizations.
9	(b) The initial term of office of the nine members
10	appointed to the council by the Governor shall be designated
11	at the time of initial appointment by the Governor as follows:
12	(1) Three members, consisting of one member
13	appointed pursuant to each of paragraphs a., b., and c. of
14	subdivision (9) of subsection (a), shall be appointed for an
15	initial term of one year. Successor members shall be appointed
16	for terms of three years.
17	(2) Three members, consisting of one member
18	appointed pursuant to each of paragraphs a., b., and c. of
19	subdivision (9) of subsection (a), shall be appointed for an
20	initial term of two years. Successor members shall be
21	appointed for terms of three years.
22	(3) Three members, consisting of one member
23	appointed pursuant to each of paragraphs a., b., and c. of
24	subdivision (9) of subsection (a), shall be appointed for an
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initial term of three years. Successor members shall be
 appointed for terms of three years.

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3 (c) Vacancies shall be filled by appointment of the
4 Governor. The person appointed to fill a vacancy shall possess
5 the same qualifications as the original appointment and shall
6 hold office for the unexpired term and until his or her
7 successor is appointed.

8 (d) The Alabama Apprenticeship Council shall serve
9 in a regulatory capacity to the Alabama Office of
10 Apprenticeship for all of the following functions:

(1) The approval of apprenticeship standards
 satisfying the requirements published in 29 CFR 29.

13 (2) Ensuring compliance of equal employment
 14 opportunity in apprenticeship, as defined in 29 CFR 30.

15 (3) Resolving disputes arising between the parties16 to an apprenticeship agreement.

(4) Providing recommendations to deregister,
suspend, or cancel apprenticeship programs that are not
compliant with state and federal apprenticeship regulations,
as published in 29 CFR 29 and Article 20, commencing with
Section 40-18-420, of Chapter 18, Title 40, Code of Alabama
1975, the Apprenticeship Tax Credit Act of 2016.

(5) Providing community outreach and education onthe benefits of apprenticeship.

(6) Assisting in the formulation of policies that
 concede the effective administration of apprenticeship
 programs.

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Section 7. (a) Nothing in Sections 1 to 7,
inclusive, of this act shall require the sponsors of
nonregistered preapprenticeships, youth apprenticeships, and
industry-recognized apprenticeships, including state agencies,
colleges and universities, and business and industry sponsors
to certify such programs with the Alabama Office of
Apprenticeship.

(b) Nothing in Sections 1 to 7, inclusive, of this act shall be interpreted as a mandate to hinder funds duly distributed to a state agency, college or university, or any other entity receiving state or federal funds in support of apprenticeship activities.

16 (c) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, with the consent of the sponsor, shall permit the State Apprenticeship 17 18 Intermediary to provide the required technical instruction and 19 technical assistance, including the implementation of the 20 competency models established in subdivision (3) of subsection 21 (h) of Section 4 that are aligned to the on-the-job training 22 for apprenticeship programs registered or certified by the 23 Alabama Office of Apprenticeship.

1 (d) The State Department of Education shall continue 2 to be the eligible agency to receive and administer career and 3 technical education funding under the Perkins Act. 4 Section 8. Sections 40-18-422, 40-18-423, and 5 40-18-424 of the Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as 6 follows: 7 "\$40-18-422. 8 "(a) An For tax years beginning on or after January 9 1, 2017, through the tax year beginning January 1, 2019, an Alabama income tax credit is hereby established allowed for 10 11 eligible employers that employ an apprentice for at least 12 seven full months of the prior taxable year. The credit shall 13 equal up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each apprentice 14employed, not to exceed five apprentices employed. The 15 Department of Revenue, in consultation with the Workforce 16 Development Division of the Department of Commerce, shall 17 establish a scale reflecting ranges of amounts of money an 18 employer has invested in an eligible apprentice and a 19 corresponding tax credit amount and shall award the tax credit 20 in accordance with this scale following confirmation from the 21 Workforce Development Division that the apprentice for whom 22 the credit is claimed is in compliance with all federal and 23 state requirements for the apprenticeship program. The credit 24 shall not be available for an individual apprentice for more

25 than four taxable years.

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1	"(b) For tax years beginning on or after January 1,
2	2020, eligible employers that employ an apprentice for at
3	least seven full months of the prior taxable year shall
4	receive a credit equal to one thousand two hundred fifty
5	dollars (\$1,250) for each apprentice employed, not to exceed
6	10 apprentices employed. The Department of Revenue, in

24	registered or industry-recognized apprenticeship program
25	registered with the Alabama Office of Apprenticeship and

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1	funded through either the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical
2	Education Act of 2006, P.L. 109-270, as revised by the
3	Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st
4	Century Act, P.L. 115-224, adult basic education and literacy
5	programs funded under Title II of the Workforce Innovation and
6	Opportunity Act, P.L. 113-128, or public workforce programs
7	funded under Title I and Title III of the Workforce Innovation
8	and Opportunity Act, P.L. 113-128, may qualify for an
9	additional tax credit, not to exceed five hundred dollars
10	(\$500) to offset the costs associated with hiring each
11	apprentice who is under the age of 18, not to exceed the
12	aggregate cap of 10 apprentices hired, as provided in
13	subsection (b). An eligible employer under this subsection may
14	claim the additional tax credit described in this subsection
15	after employing an in school youth apprentice, who satisfies
16	the specifications provided in this subsection, for 90 days.
17	" (b)<u>(</u>d) The credit shall be allowed against the tax
18	imposed by Chapter 16 or Chapter 18 of this title . This tax
19	credit shall not be allowed to decrease a taxpayer's tax
20	liability to less than zero. The credit is not refundable or
21	transferable. The credit shall be available, on a pro rata
22	basis, to the owners of qualified employers that are entities
23	taxed under subchapters S or K of the Internal Revenue Code or

25 authorized to do business in this state. An employer applying

limited liability companies or professional corporations

for a tax credit must apply each year to receive the credit
for the preceding calendar year.

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3 "(c)(e) The cumulative amount of tax credits issued 4 pursuant to this article shall not exceed three million 5 dollars (\$3,000,000) seven million five hundred thousand 6 dollars (\$7,500,000) annually. The Department of Revenue shall 7 ensure that this cap is not exceeded, shall prescribe the 8 various methods by which these credits are to be issued, and shall develop procedures to notify taxpayers at such points in 9 10 time when the tax credit caps in this subsection have been 11 reached for the applicable tax credit year.

12 "(d) (f) If an employer employs an apprentice for 13 less than the full preceding calendar year, <u>but for at least</u> 14 <u>210 days during the full preceding calendar year, then</u> the 15 employer may apply for the <u>full value of the</u> credit on a pro 16 rata monthly basis beginning on the first day of the first 17 full month of apprenticeship.

18 "(e)(g) The Department of Revenue shall prescribe a 19 form to claim this credit that provides information to the 20 department sufficient for the proper administration of the 21 credit.

"(f)(h) The participation of an employee with an
 apprenticeship program under this article and registration
 with the <u>Alabama</u> Office of Apprenticeship of the Employment
 and Training Administration of the United States Department of

1 2 Labor shall not constitute union affiliation, unless the employee expressly elects to affiliate with a union.

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"§40-18-423.

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"(a) The Alabama Office of Apprenticeship, under the 4 5 direction of the Workforce Development Division of the Department of Commerce, in coordination with the consultation 6 7 of the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Community College 8 System or its designee, may adopt any rules necessary to 9 establish standards for participation and eligibility and to 10 implement and administer this article. The division Alabama 11 Office of Apprenticeship shall consult with the Department of 12 Revenue to coordinate implementation and administration of 13 this article.

14 "(b) The division Alabama Office of Apprenticeship 15 shall provide an annual report to the Chair of the House Ways 16 and Means Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate 17 Finance and Taxation Education Committee to account for the 18 effectiveness of the apprenticeship program under this 19 article.

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"§40-18-424.

21 "The tax credit credits allowed under this article 22 shall be effective January 1, 2017, for the 2017 taxable year 23 and shall continue through the 2021 2025 tax year, unless 24 extended by act of the Legislature." Section 9. This act shall become effective on the
 first day of the third month following its passage and
 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
